

### FROM THE PRESIDENT'S HANGAR

Barry Schiff's Proficient Pilot column in the January AOPA Pilot magazine asked the question about who was the world's greatest pilot. Second in his poll was James "Jimmy" Doolittle. He has always



gotten my vote for greatest pilot because the things he did are part of everyday flying and affect all of us in the North Puget Sound Chapter.

Most pilots know of Jimmy Doolittle for his leading the bombing attack on Japan from the aircraft carrier Hornet in 1942. His place in aviation history was already secured even before this dramatic event. Dr. James Doolittle received one of the first Masters and Ph.D.s in aeronautical engineering from the Massachusettes Institute of Technology for his research on aircraft structures and aeronautics. The methodical approach to flight test is one of the legacies that is a foundation of aviation to this day. Perhaps Doolittle's greatest contribution was the invention of instrument flying with the newly invented gyroscopic instruments invented by Sperry.

The basic techniques of instrument flight discovered by Doolittle are among the first things an instrument pilot learns. Imagine Doolittle with a GPS.

Satellite navigation has made instrument flying and especially instrument approaches safer and more straightforward. The positive side to this is that there are additional instrument

approaches being created without the need for ground based radio aids. Bellingham now has two GPS approaches, as does Skagit County. The minimums are

very reasonable, allowing a properly trained pilot to shoot an approach into the wind and land. The negative side to this is that there are now a variety of directions that airplanes can approach an airport, break out of the clouds, and proceed to the runway while sharing the pattern with VFR traffic. This is especially true for the North Puget Sound area, where we often have low, but VFR ceilings, for much of the winter. At BLI there is the control tower to assist by alerting pilots in the Continued on page 5

traffic pattern of aircraft approaching on instrument approaches. At airports such as BVS (Skagit County) we are on our own to see and avoid. Now there are instrument approaches to both runways 10 and 28 at BVS, so aircraft can be emerging from the clouds in both directions. It is important that the instrument pilot call his position and intentions, and for the VFR pilot to have a mental picture of the approaching traffic. The waypoints for the GPS approaches are portrayed on approach plates and it would be great if every pilot were aware of their general location. Equally important for the instrument pilot is to recognize his responsibility to see and avoid once VMC is reached. Did you know that Doolittle could not have seen and avoided during his first instrument flight? He not only took off under the hood, he landed as well. Lt. Ben Kelsey was Doolittle's safety pilot during these experiments and kept his hands visible outside the cockpit during the first flight totally by instruments. There was a bond of trust.


