I had never flown anything with more than 235HP and this thing had about 5,000 a side. It was a full motion simulator. I got to shoot approaches and "land" at several high traffic airports including JFK, SFO, SEA, etc., in all kinds of weather conditions. I got to experience a single engine failure which was quite interesting since I am not multi-engine rated. Thank goodness for rudder trim. Even with the instructor's advice not to land nose up like in most GA airplanes that we fly, I had a tail strike which I could feel and see via confirmation of some annunciators on the panel. By the end of the "flight" I was sweating. The going rate for this particular simulator was about \$800 per hour so I feel very fortunate to have gotten some free time in it.


May Program: New EA18 Growlers of NAS Whidbey

A Follow Up on the RAF



Bill Loomis at EVCC requested that I give a taste of what General Aviation is in the US to visitors from the Royal Air Force Museum in Cosford, UK. Tim Wallis, the mentor from RAF Museum, was delighted with the short flight I provided, which took them over small airports and an airpark in our surrounding area. Tim indicated

that this was just about an impossibility in England with the cost of fuel and user fees. On researching the cost in England, I came up with fuel costs of \$8 to \$12 a gallon, landing fees of \$19 to \$64, Skyhawk rentals through flying clubs at \$270 per hour. I did not research any of the other fees. One of our past members, from England, told me that flying small aircraft does exist and most people are not aware that it does. Flights take place out of private grass strips, no transponders, no one talks to anyone, flights are short, avoiding airways and controlled airspace. The pilot still pays the owner of the strip for these privileges.

Does this stimulate you to fight against user fees?



WPA State Board Retreat

In light of the Long-term Air Transportation Study, John Sibold, WSDOT Aviation Division Director, presented an overview of the Independent Assessment for the 17 State Managed Airports. He discussed the related Aviation Goals and Inventory Benchmarks as well how we place value to each. That in turn led to the discussion of funding and how to prioritize limited resources. The true value of Mr Sibold's presentation led the Board to look at one of our primary objectives – Advocacy – and analyze what the WPA should focus on in order to preserve airports.

In addition to understanding that "all politics is local" (requiring our "local" involvement), we came away with 5 recommendations to be addressed at the State level and two specific items within WSDOT . . . all for consideration by the LATS Commission. Understand that there will be a position paper for each of the following items and that paper will require extensive research. To save our remaining 139 statewide airports we need to do the following:

At the State Level . . .

- 1. Strengthen the Noise and Safety Overlay Compliance . . . from recommendation to requirement
- 2. Essential Public Facilities and Land Use Compatibility . . . tie these two together
- 3. Height Restrictions . . . hold property owners responsible for growing or building into our airspace

At the State Level in terms of Education and Safety

- 1. Aviation Education . . . look at ways to encourage young adults to enter aviation
- 2. Liability Insurance . . . specifically research tort reform for mechanics

For WSDOT

- Encourage WSDOT to update their economic studies . . . financial impact . . . include outside the fence
- 2. Strengthen the WSDOT Grant Assurance program . . . Airports receiving funds must maintain properties as airports.

I also appointed two committees. The first will assist me and the board to deal with the technical aspects of Airspace (including TFRs) and Approaches. The second committee will act as a sounding board for all things political. This new Political Committee will be made up of Jerry Nichols, Colleen Turner and Les Flue. Our Technical Committee will be chaired by Dave Wheeler with assistance from Tom Jensen, Jack Krause and Dave Miller.
