I saw quite a few of our members there which was nice. There was something for everyone. I especially enjoyed the Seafood chowder cook-off which involved 9 different local restaurants competing for votes. For \$5 you got small sample cups of the chowders, which ranged from plain to downright exotic. One was served in an oyster shell.



Nominations for President, Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer and Chapter Director(s) for the

ensuing year shall be made at the regular meeting in October of each year. The election of these officers shall take place along with additional nominations, if any, during the regular November meeting of the Chapter. Each Officer shall serve for a term of one year, assuming office in January

Section 1 – President.

The President shall be the Chief Executive Officer of the Chapter and shall preside at all meetings of the Chapter. He shall, with the assistance of the outgoing President, submit a report of the operations of his Chapter for the fiscal year to the State President of the Washington Pilots Association at their first regular meeting each year. He shall be an ex-officio member of all standing committees of the Chapter, sign all official documents, counter-sign all checks unless waived by the President, appoint all committees, and perform such duties as are required of this office.

<u>Section 1a.</u> The President, an implied member of the State WPA Board of Directors, shall attend annual state WPA Conventions and represent the Chapter as directed by the State WPA Board of Directors. The President's convention registration fee and basic convention lodging shall be paid from the Chapter treasury.

Section 2- Vice President.

In the absence or disability of the President, the Vice President shall exercise all powers and perform all duties of the Office of the President. The Vice President shall act as parliamentarian at all Chapter Meetings.

<u>Section 3 – Secretary.</u>

It shall be the duty of the Secretary of the Chapter to keep the minutes of all the meetings. The Secretary shall attend to the giving and serving of all notices of the Chapter, handle all correspondence, and is custodian of all documents and records, and shall keep a current list of all members.

<u>Section 4 – Treasurer.</u>

The Treasurer shall notify all members when dues are payable and receive all monies. The Treasurer shall notify the Membership Standing Committee Chairperson who will notify the applicant for membership of their election or rejection. The Treasurer shall give receipts for all monies and deposit same in the name of the Chapter in such repository as shall be selected by the members. The Treasurer shall keep correct records of the financial affairs of the Chapter, making monthly reports of said finances, have custody of all funds belonging to the Chapter and disburse same as authorized by the members. The Treasurer shall collect all annual dues and issue proper receipts to the members. He shall remit to the State Secretary or Treasurer within thirty days after receipt, appropriate dues together with the current name and address of each member paying dues and a statement as to whether each member's dues are for a new or renewal of membership.

<u>Section 5 – Chapter Directors.</u>

Chapter Directors, by nature of their three year term, are to provide direction and continuity to the Board of Directors. The Chapter Directors, elected by the members, and the outgoing President acting as a Chapter Director, shall each be assigned by the newly elected President to act as Chairperson pro tem for one of the four Standing Committees. (See Article VIII - Committees)

The purpose of the awards is to recognize and acknowledge to the membership and/or general public the performance of acts that tend to promote or advance the public image of our aviation interest and make them more appreciative as to the benefits aviation produces for the public even though they may not seem directly related.

<u>Section 2 – Nominations.</u> Nominations will be made by letter (e-mail accepted) and submitted to the nominating committee not later than the last Board meeting in October. The nominating committee will establish award recipients by a majority vote of a quorum and presented to the Board at a Board Meeting in November

<u>Pilot of the Year.</u> This is the highest award the Chapter may give. The nominations shall be a licensed pilot judged to have made outstanding contribution(s) to the advancement of general aviation throughout the past year. Recipient of this award shall be nominated for the State WPA Pilot of the Year competition.

Sponsor of the Year. To be awarded to the individual, group, or company who contributes most significantly in helping the Chapter to achieve its stated goals. This contribution should not be a

financial one but rather should be based on the greatest contribution of effort, expertise, donated services or facilities and leadership training by the example it sets.

<u>Sparkplug of the Year.</u> This Award shall be given to the person or persons, who by their enthusiasm, talent, leadership ability and hard work inspire others to get involved and actively participate in the projects of the Chapter.

The Wright Stuff. The Wright Stuff Award shall be given in response to circumstances surrounding an incident that required outstanding flying or judgment. The criterion is that the aircraft must have been under power with a pilot in command.



Festival takes to the sky from the Journal Newspapers by Theresa Poalucci

Be sure and stretch your neck and look to the skies above Mukilteo on Saturday, Sept. 6 at 2 p.m. when the Washington Pilots Association present their annual fly over for the Mukilteo Festival. "We will have the Northwest Beechboys flying their Beechcraft Bonanzas in formation," said Stephanie Allen, a volunteer for the association, pilot and Mukilteo resident. "It should be a flight of four." The Blackjack Squadron of RVaircraft will be next in line. The group has been involved in the fly over every year since the Washington Pilots Association has been involved in the festival. The Blackjacks will be followed by two high wing flyers, a Cessna Aerobat and a 1969 Skyhawk. The Skyhawk is an authentic restoration that recently won the top award you can get for a the restoration of an aircraft, called the Lindy, at the biggest aircraft show and convention in the world. Unlike other awards which recognize lifetime or professional achievement, the only way you can earn a Lindy Award is to be judged the Grand Champion or Reserve Grand Champion in one of eleven competitive categories at EAA AirVenture in Oshkosh, Wisconsin. When I asked Stephanie if she had any pictures of this award wining plane to go with this article, she said yes, because the Skyhawk happens to belong to her. "I didn't want to sound like I was bragging," she laughed. Her husband Rich Jones, also has a championship plane, the Bonanza which he is flying with the Beech Boys. In fact at the Championships it was announced that they were the only couple to have three Lindy's between them. Something no couple has done before. Jones will not only be flying at this event, he is also the airboss, which means he works on all the choreography spectators will see. The Muikilteo Festival Fly over finishes with the Historic Flight Foundation. John Sessions will be flying a P51, "which is a war bird" explained Allen. Sessions also won best P51 at AirVenture in Oshgosh. The emcee will be Les Smith from Mukilteo. Smith is the vice president for the Paine Field Chapter of the Washington Pilots Association. He is also a pilot and aircraft owner and understands the work that goes into formation flying, something he will be able to pass along to the audience as they look upward.

WPA Members Reports on Places to go.

West Yellowstone, MT (KWYS)

On Sunday 7/20, the day I was planning on flying to SE Alaska I changed plans due to bad weather and decided instead to fly to Yellowstone which was on my list of destinations to explore anyway. The route was PAE-YKM-PDT-MYL (McCall Idaho) where we stopped for the night because of some convective activity ahead. McCall airport is at 5000 feet but density altitude was at 7700 when we arrived. McCall airport is a nice place to stop at with a state park nearby that could be a destination by itself. The next morning we got up a little earlier than the previous day and took off before things got too hot. The route was MYL-DBS-Sabat INT-WYS. We flew both days at 11,500. The views were great and the flight was comfortable (not much turbulence at 10 am). We enjoyed a good tail wind most of the way.



West Yellowstone airport was pretty quiet at the time we arrive although this airport is served by SkyWest. The runway is long and wide; the FBO employees (Sandy, Marry) were very friendly and helpful. There was a follow-me golf cart waiting for me on the ramp and we followed it to



the tie down spot. Sandy helped with the tie down and lift back to the terminal where we got the car (Avis in the terminal). We drove the car back to aerial side and loaded the car with all the stuff including camping gear. The airport has a free pilot campground on the north side where we met another pilot later on. This airport is the closest to the park – just about 10 minutes drive. We found a campground to spend the first night with no issues but were unsuccessful the next day. There are several first-come-first-serve campgrounds in the park that can get full as early as 12 noon. What we should have done was to head towards the area we were going to hike in and then go to the campground first, reserve the site and then go hiking. Next time. We ended up leaving the park that evening while a thunderstorm was hitting us with heavy rain and hail and still we couldn't find any place to stay in the park. That's when we tried the pilot campground at the airport – it was perfect. It has even an improvised hot shower, water, BBQ pit and a restroom. Also, there are 6 mountain bikes locked (emergency frequency to unlock) there for pilot use to explore the trails nearby.

On the way back we stopped once again in McCall ID for fuel and lunch. This time we flew at 10,500 (less of a headwind than at 12,500). After an hour we got back to the airplane and it would not start. I knew it was vapor lock but didn't know what else to do besides letting time pass. As I was trying to start it before giving up, I saw 2 smiling guys approaching the airplane with

name tags on their shirts. I thought naively to myself that they were from McCall Aviation FBO and came to suggest something about starting this engine (IO-360). And then they shook my hand and started saying: "we are from the federal government..." and I completed the sentence "and you are here to help me". ? They smiled and laughed but quickly turned to business like and told me that they are conducting a ramp check. All the articles I have ever read about ramp checks quickly went through my head but the only thing I said was "sure, I have all the time in the world... doesn't look it would start very soon". They asked for airworthiness? certificate, registration, medical and pilot license. They verified the documents in 2-3 minutes and thanked me for the cooperation. I almost felt like asking them if they were joking with me since this was too easy but decided to shut up this time. I went into the FBO, asked to talk to the chief maintenance person and learned a new trick. He suggested I remove the fuel caps for 5 minutes and let air in, put them back on and then try to start. That worked. While in the FBO I saw the FAA guys waiting for a King Air pilot to arrive and chatted with them a little. I promised them to spread the word and tell about my pleasant experience and that they are not as bad as some articles (that they read too) portray them. In 20 years of flying I have never had a ramp check and did not expect it to happen in a non towered airport...



By the way, McCall is a good gateway to Idaho wilderness. Johnson Creek airport is a must, I was told. It is a grass strip.

All in all we spent 3 days in the park in addition to the night we spent in McCall on the way to Yellowstone. It took us about 4:30 hours to get there and 5 hours to get back. Total cost of the trip was \$1000 for the 2 of us, with \$500 just in airplane fuel!
