





NOTAM PAE Runway & Taxiway Closure Check ATIS and NOTAMS

Beginning Thursday morning August 6th, the north 2010' of runway 16R-34L will be closed leaving 7000' of usable runway

from August 6th to September 9th for a total reconstruction of the north 1,000 feet of the runway. The new pavement will be concrete.

Runway 16R-34L will be closed nightly from 9pm to 7am August from August 10th to September 9th for runway grooving and

reinstalling runway centerline lights. Night time closures will be Monday through Friday nights.

Runway 16R-34L closed for 107 continuous hours beginning at 9pm on September 4, 2009 and ending at 8am hours on

September 9, 2009 to finish the grade tie-in from the new concrete section of the runway to the asphalt section. Installation

of the touchdown zone light cans and the construction of the west portion new Alpha 2.5 intersection will also occur during this closure.

Runway 16R-34L will be closed nightly from 9pm to 7am beginning September 9th for reinstallation of the centerline lights

and pavement grooving. Night time closures will be Monday through Friday nights and go through end of September.

This complex project has a tight timeline and some major uncertainties—like the weather and the second

Round-the-World Record Pilot CarolAnn Garratt Speaks at Museum Aug. 25

Distance flights driven by the heart over the mind SEATTLE, Aug. 7, 2009—In December 2008, pilots Carol Ann Garratt and Carol Foy flew a small, single engine airplane around the world in a record time of eight and half days. It was the second global trip for Garratt, who flew around the world in 2003 to raise awareness and donations for amyotrophic lateral sclerosis—ALS, or Lou Gehrig's Disease—after her mother suffered and died from ALS. The 2008 flight was also for ALS awareness. Garratt will speak about her journeys and what inspired them in a presentation at The Museum of Flight on Tuesday, Aug. 25 at 7 p.m. in the William M. Allen Theater. The airplane she flew on both trips—a Mooney M-20J—will be on view outside of the Museum all day. Admission to the program is \$10 for Museum non-members and \$5 for Museum members. After 18 months of planning Garratt and co-pilot Carol Foy set out from Florida's Orlando International Airport on Dec. 2, 2008 to fly around the world westbound. They arrived back in Orlando 8 days, 12 hours and 20 minutes later. Garratt's program will not only look at the inspiration and logistics of the trip, but also what it is like to share a small cockpit for 158 hours, leaving the plane only 8 times to refuel and stretch. A resident of Ocala, Fla., Garratt is a former manager with a Fortune 500 company. She earned her private pilot license in 1978 and her instrument rating in 1980. In 1996, she completed her commercial license and bought a Mooney in 2000. She has over 3,500 hours and flies more than 400 hours a year including flying the sick and needy with Angel Flights, and instructing cadets with the Civil Air Patrol. Garratt has written two books describing her adventures, "Upon Silver Wings: Global Adventure in a Small Plane," and "Upon Silver Wings II: World-

Where Members Fly: Sun Mountain Lodge, Winthrop by Greg Bell



In mid-July I flew my wife Lori and I to Sun Mountain Lodge in Winthrop, WA to celebrate an anniversary. The closest airport is S52 – Methow Valley State, which is about a 15 mile drive to the lodge. The resort will pick you up and drop you off at the airport for free. S52 is a very nice facility with a 5049' X 60' runway. It is probably the nicest state owned airport in Washington. It is a smoke jumper base and there are notes to use caution during fire season for heavily loaded firefighting tanker aircraft doing long straight-out departures.

We departed Paine at about 0800 to avoid any heat induced turbulence. Our flight was smooth as silk, much to Lori's delight. The Cascades were spectacular, especially Glacier Peak which we flew just north of. Our direct route took us over Stehekin and the north end of Lake Chelan. S52 is only 91 NM direct from PAE. We landed shortly before 0900 and the concierge from the hotel was there waiting for us. When we arrived our room was ready and they let us check-in very early, about 10AM. It was like getting a free extra day.

There are lots of things to do at Sun Mountain in the summer, such as horseback riding, bicycling (road & mountain), bird watching, boating, hiking, golfing, fishing, whitewater rafting, tennis and swimming. We highly recommend the Cowboy Camp dinner where you ride via horseback or covered wagon to a place out in the woods where you get a delicious dinner cooked by cowboys. It wasn't just baked beans either, we had steak and barbecued chicken, with cornbread, salad and pineapple upside-down cake for dessert. We even got music played by a real cowboy musician. It is also a winter destination with cross-country and alpine skiing, snowshoeing, ice skating and sleigh rides.

The resort has two nice restaurants with good food and panoramic views. They also have a nice gift shop, activity center, spa and a bike rental shop. We didn't miss not having a car. The town of Winthrop is about 10 miles by road away and the resort would have given us a free ride, but we were having too much fun to leave. Winthrop is setup like an old Western town with saloons, blacksmith, etc. It looks like a film set for a cowboy movie.

We arrived at the hotel on a Sunday so we got the discounted weekday rate, plus there were hardly any people there. We had the outdoor pool and hot tub pretty much to ourselves. The resort sits about 1,000 feet above the valley floor so the views in all directions are breathtaking. The sunsets from our deck were incredible. Lake Patterson is a short walk from the main lodge and there are cabins available for rent there. The staff was very helpful, friendly, courteous and professional. We would definitely like to go back someday.
