Finally a huge thanks to Frank Hummel and his army of volunteers for doing such a great job of pulling off the best Aviation Days ever!


June 1st Program: Scott Carson retired executive vice president of The Boeing Company.

Until earlier in 2009, he served as president and chief executive officer of Boeing Commercial Airplanes where he was responsible for all of the company's commercial airplane programs and related services, which in 2008 generated revenues of more than \$28.2 billion.

In September 2007, Carson was appointed to the Washington State University Board of Regents by Washington Governor Christine Gregoire. Carson also

serves on the board of governors of the WSU Foundation; is chair of the WSU College of Business and Economics national board of advisors; and is on the College of Engineering and Architecture advisory board. Previously, he served on the advisory panel for the University of Washington Executive MBA program and, in April 2002, received the Business Leadership award from the program. In January 2004, Carson became a Fellow of the Royal Aeronautical Society.

Named to that position in September 2006, Carson also served as a member of the Boeing Executive Council and as Boeing's senior executive in the Pacific Northwest. In August 2009, Carson announced his intention to retire at the end of 2009 after a successful 36-year career at the aerospace giant. He continues to support special projects, including serving as the chairman of United Way of King County's 2009-2010 annual fundraising campaign.



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
Legislative Corner

Land use issues continue to be the number one concern facing General Aviation here in Washington. We are down to 135 public use airports, having lost four since late 2008. John Dobson, Immediate Past President of WPA, is Executive Director for the Port of Shelton, is chairing the Aviation Committee of the Washington Public Ports Commission. Their agenda currently includes the topic, but is stymied by recent court findings that have called into question the authority granted to the Growth Management Hearings Board by the Growth Management Act of 1990. These recent findings illustrate and confirm the contention that our state's land use laws do not have sufficient "teeth", if you will, to protect airports as Essential Public Facilities. Watch for more on this in upcoming WINGS state newsletters.

There are reports of the WA Department of Revenue contacting informal flying clubs, investigating the financial arrangements whereby there might be uncollected taxation opportunities. If you are a member of a flying club or group that has been contacted by the WA Department of Revenue, State President Dave Lucke would like to hear your story. President Waterman recently reported that pilots in Washington State have a new resource for demonstrating the critical contribution aviation makes to their communities, and beyond. According to the Washington State Department of Transportation (WSDOT) Aviation Division's newly released 2012 Statewide Aviation Economic Impact Study, airport-related activity generated by the state's 135 public-use airports creates 248,500 jobs, provides \$15.3 billion in wages, and sets \$50.9 billion in total economic activity in motion. As pilots you are encouraged to familiarize yourselves with the report's findings, and share them. Educating decision makers about the value of general aviation is our best tool in advocating for sound aviation policies.



Enjoy the freedom of flight, and remember that your freedoms come from the actions of the citizenry!
