Carolyn and I departed for Oshkosh AirVenture on Wednesday July 18th. We followed I-90 through the continental divide via Missoula (fuel), Anaconda, Butte and finally Billings. Following fuel and food in Billings, we went on to Dickenson, ND where we called it "quits" for the day after eight and a half hours of flying and over eleven hours including stops.



The next day we only progressed to Jamestown, ND where we needed

to wait out weather in our path. Fuel and food provided the time we needed for the weather to pass. We then went on to Moorhead, MN where we stopped for the night and I was able to visit a former colleague who is now working for Appareo in Fargo, ND. In case you haven't been following, Appareo Systems makes a GPS/ADS-B receiver that works with Foreflight on the iPad. It works great!

The following day we flew south to Alexandria, MN where a line of convective storms halted our progress again. Food and fuel seem to work great to pass the time for weather to clear out. We then flew on to Eau Claire, WI and then on to Nowatzski Field, WI where we stayed with friends for the night.

Nowatzski Field is just about 15 miles from Ripon, where the conga line forms for AirVenture arrivals. We took our place in line, rocked our wings and were cleared for runway 27 on the "green dot". It was a challenge not to overtake an LSA ahead who wasn't real consistent with altitude or airspeed, but we managed. We were parked with the vintage aircraft and camped under the wing for six nights.

AirVenture was wonderful. Carolyn described it as Arlington on steroids. We had a great time deciding what to see, where to go and what to do. There is so much, you just can't see it all in a week. We bumped into Jerry Richardson who flew commercial into Chicago and drove to the event. Our camp survived two strong thunderstorms on Wednesday and Thursday July 25th and 26th. Others around us weren't as lucky as the microburst's shredded a few tents.

We departed early Friday morning into a "VFR" sky. We flew home on a southerly route via Madison, Dubuque, Cedar Rapids, Sioux City and finally O'Neill, NE. What's in O'Neill Nebraska? Our oldest son, Andrew flying BE99s for Ameriflight! We had a great weekend with Andrew catching up on things and getting the royal "tour" of his office, the BE99.

Leaving O'Neill we flew to Rapid City, SD (Made a flight seeing tour around Mt Rushmore as well as Devil's Tower), and we stopped for fuel and food in Sheridan, WY. Our last stop for the day was Billings, MT where we stayed for the night. The next day was cooler and clear as we retraced our route along I-90 over the "rocks".

The total trip included just over 29 hours flight time. Carolyn and I split the legs and the duties as PIC and Nav. We both really enjoyed ourselves and had a great experience. Carolyn is already asking ... when is the next time?

Know before you go how much weight you can carry. You can count on passenger weights of more than 100 pounds.
