The Spokane chapter of the Washington Pilots Association enjoyed a great program on February 20th. SrA Bryan Smith (USAF) from the 66th Training Squadron at Fairchild Air Force Base presented the topic of survival skills. His presentation was thorough, informative and brought out some lively discussion. Mr. Smith also brought examples of survival packs that were suitable for light aircraft ranging from 1 cubic foot to smaller than the size of a VCR tape.

One of the questions that came out in the discussion was ELTs. February 1, 2009, the Search and Rescue Satellite Aided Tracking (SARSAT) satellites will no longer monitor or report signals from 121.5/243 MHz ELTs. Overflying aircraft (commercial/military) will still monitor 121.5/243 MHz, but the satellite system will no longer do so. ELT signals transmitted on 406 MHz will be monitored and processed by both Geostationary Operational Environmental Satellites (GEOS) and SARSAT satellites, after February 2009.

Differences between the two ELT systems are substantial. Current 121.5/243 MHz technology broadcasts a continuous analog oscillating signal between the two frequencies at about ½ watt output. The satellites pick the signal up signal. However, since it's analog, the satellite, and search and rescue units must be within range of each other to triangulate the signal. This establishes a search area of 12 nm or about 450 square miles.

The 406 MHz ELT units broadcast a digital signal that can be encoded with registration information (owner, aircraft N number, etc). The signal output is 5 watts and may also be integrated with GPS positioning for greater accuracy. Without GPS integration, the search area is reduced to 2 nm or 12.5 square miles. The addition of GPS integration further reduces the search area to about 0.05 nm or 0.008 square miles.

Survival - It's a lot more than "Outwit, outplay, and outlast!" Build a basic survival kit for your flying safety

Heading out on a flight? Here's the basic survival kit that was presented by Senior Airman Bryan Smith from the USAF Survival School at Fairchild Air Force Base.

Cutting Tools- <u>Fixed Blade Knife (1)</u>-RAT 5, Ontario, Pilots Survival Knife <u>Folding Knife (1)</u>-*Leatherman*, Benchmade, US Knife <u>Saws (1)</u>-Wire Saw, Pocket Chain Saw, *Wyoming Saw*, T Handle

Fire Building Materials-<u>Tinder (1 TYPE)</u> - Wet Fire, *Trioxine*, fire logs, etc

Ignition (1) - Waterproof Matches, *metal match*, lighters **Cord and Wire -** 550 cord (15-50 FEET), Snare wire (4-10 FEET)

Protective Materials (1 OR 2 AT LEAST 6'X6') -US Army poncho, Space Blanket, 3 mm plastic bag, Plastic drop cloth

Clothing – Poncho, Jacket, Stocking Cap, Flop hat, Gloves

Signaling - Signal Mirror, Signal Panel, PLB, Radio/ Cell Phone

Miscellaneous - Water container (*platypus*, MSR), Water purification Tablets, Any multi use item.

Knowledge-Knowledge is free weightless and takes up no space.

Principles to remember:

Multi Use items-Select items that can be used to meet multiple needs

Small-Smaller lighter items are available at outdoor stores (Mt. Gear, REI,

DiamondbackTactical.com). Back packers

require light small good quality items.

Durable-Select items of a quality that you are willing to have your life rely on.

Familiar-Know how to use items in your kit, use them around the house, on camping trips, etc.

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Historic airliner flys again
