#### Big airplanes in the sky and you



This months' WPA program features Major Mathew Koerschner, Chief of Flight Safety, 92<sup>nd</sup> Air Refueling Wing, Fairchild Air Force Base, and Captain John Alsbrooks, Chief of Safety and a Helicopter pilot with 36<sup>th</sup> Rescue Flight at Fairchild. Captain Alsbrooks flies rescue missions in eastern Washington, Idaho, and western Montana.

Major Koerschner and Captain Alsbrooks will discuss several topics of interest to GA pilots who fly in the vicinity of the base. Topics will include some of the rescue mission conducted this year, the newly reconstructed runway at FAFB, upcoming training military training events involving FAFB, and the large training exercise planned for next year called Rodeo 2013. Throughout their discussion they will highlight the need for GA pilots to be alert for military aircraft through see and avoid and awareness of the Special Use Airspace and Military Training Routes that criss-cross eastern Washington.

I had been accepted to the University of Idaho and I knew that they had good ROTC (Reserve Officer Training Corps) programs.

I now plan to attend the University of Idaho and apply for a spot in Naval ROTC. I would like to pursue a degree in Mechanical Engineering and become a pilot in the Navy. I am so blessed to have the connections that I have and to have had the opportunities I did. I know now that flying is the career for me. It is amazing that the abstract thought of a junior in high school has now become my dream career that I will now pursue through all the turns in the road.

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#### NextGen update by John Townsley



A couple of very interesting things have surfaced regarding NextGen. There are more guestimates on the cost of the required aircraft equipment-possibly \$10,000+ for "small" GA aircraft and \$100K+ for transport category aircraft. There are also some interesting discussions of how to squeeze more money from air travelers to pay for the system. Part of this includes an interesting discussion of a national sales tax on fuel and one of the very interesting things not said in the analysis is that the cost of NextGen for an "average-valued" GA aircraft of about \$50K is projected to be at least 20% of hull value. Equipping an average valued transport category aircraft will be about 0.1% of hull value.

It looks more and more that the sky will be a lot less crowded, and the ramps will be quite roomy after January 1, 2020.
