

Vets fly high on 18th annual Fall Foilage flight

WPA thanked the Veterans of the Inland Northwest with the 19th annual "Fall Foliage" flight from Felts Field. It was the largest recorded turnout- eight pilots, 26 Vets, two PT's, three kids, and four active US Air Force volunteers were flown in seven aircraft for approximately 6,200 pilot/passenger-miles. This year's organizer, Geoff Scott, humbled by enthusiasm and willingness of those involved said; "I had simply asked Fairchild Base Command Chief Nordell if anyone flew civilian aircraft, or were willing to volunteer to help out. We had 16 inquiries within a week!" This unique inclusion led to an abundance of ground-support allowing pilots to simply focus on flight.

Pilots Tom Morris, Jerry Baur, Blake McKinley, Dave Dufour of Spokane Airways, Mike Eller, Paul Vietsze, and Mike Scalera, eyed weather forecasts calling for wind-gusts and three-mile visibility later in the day, but the conditions, once aloft, proved about the best fall has to offer. "Awesome flight" said veteran 'Chris.' "This is a lot better than any of those military flights I've been on. You have WINDOWS!" Tom Morris, concurring on the common frequency said; "Our passenger beverage service unfortunately had to be terminated due to some moderate chop at 6,500, but, the views are spectacular."

Special thanks Subway for the tasty food and Mike, for the solo guitar while vets, active personnel and pilots exchanged stories in a unique bridging of time and generations.

To top off the day, Veterans Administration's Pam Wicks presented Mike Eller with a special plaque commemorating his 18 years of involvement and compassion for our area's veterans. It was a truly well-deserved moment of honor for a man who has given so much back to these veterans.

Scouts earn **Aviation Merit Badges**

On Saturday October 3rd the WPA-Spokane Chapter, with the support of the EAA-Chapter 79, hosted the first Youth Aviation Adventure program held in the Northwest! This program was offered to



the Inland Northwest Council-Boy Scouts of America. There were sixty Aviation Merit Badges earned by Scouts representing twenty-one Troops.

During this event the participants rotate every twenty minutes through nine stations designed to expose youth to the realm of aviation while meeting the requirements of the Boy Scouts of America Aviation Merit Badge. To pull this event off there were twenty volunteers who helped by checking in the Scouts and the associated paperwork for the merit badges, station instructors, and group hosts who were responsible for getting their group of Scouts from station to station. The stations covered Pre-Flight Inspection, Aviation in the Know game, Power Plants, Airport Operations, Careers in Aviation, a Glider Kit Activity, Instrument Panel, Certificates and Ratings, and Aerodynamics. Even though the day was the coldest that we had experienced to that point of the Fall, all the Scouts and the volunteers sported big smiles and remained enthusiastic for the four hours that it took to rotate these Scouts through the stations.

There seems to be a great deal of interest from the Inland Northwest Council for another event. Next year we will plan to host another event in the late Spring. We are planning to talk with the Girl Scouts to offer this program to them in a format that would meet the requirements of their Aviation Merit Badges. In addition, there has been interest in offering this program to the Aviation Explorers program.

WPA SPOKANE CHAPTER FLY-OUT REPORT: Columbia Crest Winery

Originally up to four aircraft had planned to fly out to Patterson, Washington to visit the Columbia Crest Winery on Saturday September 26th. The day dawned clear with light winds, and all but two aircraft had cancelled. Of the remaining two, one of the parties of four was under the weather and not feeling well. Ultimately, "plane pooling" made more sense. So at 10:00 Dave Lucke departed Felts Field with Carolyn and Gary White aboard as passengers in his C-182.

The flight was smooth and severe clear. However, head winds slowed the C-182s progress to 100 kts or slightly below at times. The Columbia Crest Winery airport is about 40 nm SW of Pasco. The runway is paved and about 4000 ft long.



Once the aircraft was secured and the picnic lunch was in hand, we walked the ½ mile or so to the winery. We met our host, Vanessa and were preparing to participate in a "self-guided" tour. Dave noticed a sign stating that a guided tour would begin in about an hour, so instead we picked up the picnic lunch and moved outside. We found a beautiful setting by a pond, under a willow tree in the shade and enjoyed a fantastic lunch with a great view of the Columbia River and the activity as trucks pulled in with the fresh grape harvest. This weekend was the "Catch the Crush" where special discounts were offered on selected varieties of wines.

The tour was very informative and the scale of the operation was amazing. The tour was about an hour long, with most of it spent underground in the storage/aging facility. The underground portion of the winery encompasses 20 acres of temperature and humidity conditioned space. We saw everything from the "select" varieties (all hand produced and oak barrel aged) to the more contemporary stainless steel tanks two stories high. The facility seemed to stretch forever. Following the tour, it was "tasting time". Dave volunteered as the "designated pilot", and Carolyn and I sampled some of the finished product. With a substantial discount, we loaded up purchases into a van and were driven to the airport for the flight home.

Once established in cruise at 7500 ft, the headwinds now tailwinds really gave a nice push. Ground speeds of 175 kts appeared and towns appeared and disappeared quickly. As Ritzville neared, it was apparent to the SSE that a lot of freshly tilled soil was being picked up by the winds. Clouds of it were moving into Spokane, reducing visibility as we sailed along. Felts Field ATIS was reporting winds 250 at 15 with gusts 28, temperature 27 and altimeter 30.00. Landing on runway 21L, Dave put the Cessna down like a butterfly with sore feet, chirp, chirp, and chirp. General aviation made the trip a pleasure, not an endurance run on the ground and a great time was had by all.
